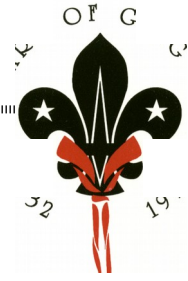

Edinburgh Gang Show 2019 - Edinburgh's 60th show

Interesting recollections from a former member of the show which I'm sure will prompt some conversations:

I was in my first Gang Show in 1942, just 12 years of age and it was so exciting. The songs we sang! Naturally there was 'Crest of a Wave' but one other that remains in my mind is 'Riding Down To Rio'. Obviously we had rehearsals but the show was on for four nights and we all went home each night with the make-up still on. I swear that some of The Gang did not wash it off until the next morning. Oh, and we had an Air Raid Alarm

sounded each night, but took no notice because, had a bomb had hit us we would all have been together with family and friends. How all of this came together was like this:-

At the age of seven my mate, Geoff Reynolds, and I discussed the relative merits of two organisations of which we knew, Life Boys and Cubs. They both met on the same night at the same time so we concluded that the only way to sort this out was to each go to one and compare afterwards. I drew the Life Boys and duly attended while Geoff went to Cubs. After two weeks we did our comparisons and on week three (you can't make a decision on just one week) I went with Geoff to Cubs. Week four and I went back to Life Boys – to get back the money I had paid in for a Uniform! Week five and I joined Cubs.

When I had asked my Dad if I could go to Life Boys his response puzzled me for he said, "You'll be learning to form fours soon enough Lad, but go on then." And so I became a member of the 123rd North London Cub Pack. What a Pack! There was Akela in charge and Baloo, Harty, Baghera and Shere Khan. It was the answer to a small boy's dream – Absolute Mayhem. But I rose to be Secunder of Red Six! Thus began a membership of Scouting that lasted for the next thirty five years. However, my Dad's response made no sense to me then but this was 1937. Two years later, when Geoff and I went to Cubs at the end of August 1939 we were greeted by the Group Scout Master with the news that, "There will be no more Scouts or Cubs until all this is over because all the Scouters have been 'called up' and I cannot do it on my own. Sorry Lads." Which meant that they were now all in the Armed Services, Lady Scouters as well! There was despair and dismay among the assembled Cubs but little time to talk about it for we were all then involved in evacuation, some with their schools and some privately. Geoff went with the school and his Mother to March in Cambridgeshire while my Sister and I were taken to Maidenhead in Berkshire to be with my Aunt, Uncle and two cousins. Cousin Brian was about the same age as my Sister (four year older than me) while Cousin Brenda was two months younger than me. We travelled there on the 2nd of September 1939, we had to listen to the broadcast by Neville Chamberlain (Prime Minister) at eleven o'clock the next morning, which finished with the memorable words, "... so, as of eleven o'clock this morning Great Britain is at war with Germany."

At the beginning of October Mother arrived in Maidenhead to collect her two children and took us back to Tottenham. Back home I discovered that Geoff was already back (he'd only been away a week) and our friendship was consolidated anew. We eventually joined the nearest Scouts, the 106th North London, which was growing in numbers because other Groups were closing and their Scouts were coming as well. The 106th was fortunate in having two Scouters who would never be 'called up' because Skip, John Leone, was beyond the age and Homer, Charlie Last, was a Glass Blower by trade. While this pair of very good Scouters kept the movement going, they had another vital attribute, they had been in the London Gang Show before the war. Which is why the 106th put on a Gang Show in 1942 in the church hall of St. Mary's Church, to which we were attached and fully supported by our incumbent Vicar. And I was fortunate enough to be there.

The 106th Scout Troop slowly morphed into the Tottenham District Gang Show and was held at the Swimming Baths at High Cross, usually in January. During the winter a sprung floor was installed over the swimming bath itself, for they also held a dance every Saturday. It was in this salubrious environment that we performed for a whole week, Monday to Saturday, and always 'Sold Out'. Parents and friends always being a guaranteed audience – on pain of death!

At eighteen, like every other boy in the Country, I was subject to spend two years in the Armed Forces and again struck lucky by being put into The Royal Air Force. At twenty they set me loose upon the world again and this happened in November 1949. I went to a Gang Show rehearsal and was immediately given a part. I had five weeks to learn the part which was a central character in a play by Ralph Reader called 'Great Oaks'. So Gang Show re-entered my life each year. Ralph had the beginning of the war had been summoned to Ad Astra House (HQ. R.A.F) and asked to create groups of people to travel to RAF Stations and entertain the airmen. Many former members of the Gang Show were by now serving airmen and Ralph was able to get them posted to his new unit. 'The RAF Gang Show' was thus created. Many famous names in British entertainment after the war had their talents spotted and honed from their membership of this illustrious association. After the war 'The RAF Gang Show' toured the British Isles commercially ending in 1950. The first Scout Gang Show after the war was performed in 1951 at 'The King's Theatre', Hammersmith. In 1952 it transferred to Golders

Green Hippodrome which was a bigger theatre, seating over 2000, about a third more than the King's. The Gang was offered The Palladium, much bigger but, because of its acoustics one must work with a microphone, was totally unsuitable for our show.

The London Show was always put on in the first two weeks of December, which are, or were, dead weeks in show business being the rehearsal time for Pantomime. In case you are unaware the very first Gang Show was in 1932 and was put on in Holborn for a Scout Troop there. Ralph Reader had come back to England, from America where he had made his name as a Choreographer/Director and worked with the big names of the American stage. He originated from Crewkerne, Somerset, where he had been a Scout. Back in England he sought out a local Scout Troop because of his enjoyment in his youth. Finding this Holborn Group and realising how poor they were, he suggested they 'put on a show'. He wrote the words, composed the music, directed the show and publicised it. Because he was in show business he was advised not to put his name to it, so everything was done by 'A Holborn Rover'. Having done all this they still didn't have a name. Ralph asked the boys and one bright spark (Could have been Dinky Rew- a cub then.) "Why don't we call it the Gang Show? Cos you always come in and say, 'Hi Gang!'" From such is fame.

Ralph was called in by The Chief, Baden Powell, and asked if he would make this show into a London Show because Scouting had been given the chance to purchase Gilwell Park in Chingford, which would make a superb Training Ground for London Scouts. Ralph agreed and so The London Gang Show began. They were so good that they were invited twice to become part of The Royal Command Performance. Now that really is an accolade, for you have been judged by Show Business itself, The Professionals. I was only in 1952 and 1953 shows for I got married and moved out into South-East Essex. Transport was not like it is now and would have involved me in about an hour and a half each way – if there was a train running. So I reluctantly had to bow out. I still retained my connections with Scouting and even formed a Scout Group, the 5th Rayleigh, which this Year is to celebrate its 60th Birthday. Now I live in the East Midlands, am surrounded by Gang Shows and am a member of a Scout Lodge in Freemasonry, I am pleased to say.
